Dear Parents and Guardians,

Our school year is off to a great start! We are excited about our new mission, vision, slogan and logos; our new hires to the district; the implementation of Readers' Workshop; and the change to our recess and lunch schedule with the addition of RtI time. As a learning community, we are continually looking to improve the Richfield Schools and School District. One source we use to reflect on our strengths and areas for improvement is the School Report Card.

The Department of Public Instruction (DPI) creates a School Report Card and District Report Card for every publicly funded school and district in the state. These report cards can be accessed online here: http://dpi.wi.gov/accountability/report-cards, a link is also available on our website. The Report Cards are intended to help all schools and districts utilize data on specific measures to target improvement efforts to ensure students are ready for the next educational step. For Richfield this specifically includes the next grade level and graduation, but it also means preparing our students for success beyond our community in high school, college, and careers.

Some schools, like ours, do not have the data necessary to calculate School Report Card scores and instead participate in an <u>Alternate Accountability</u> process. This includes new schools; K-2 schools; schools without tested grades; schools exclusively serving at-risk students; and schools with fewer than 20 full academic year students. Because the report cards depend on multiple data points across multiple years, DPI cannot calculate a traditional report card score for schools in these scenarios. For the 2015-16 school year, our school fell into this Alternate Accountability process.

Alternate Accountability is a district-supervised self-evaluation process in which schools report and evaluate their performance in raising student achievement in a reading, mathematics, and in preparing students to be on-track for college and careers. These priority areas align to those found in the School Report Cards. Instead of the five rating categories on the report card, Alternate Accountability schools receive a rating of either *Satisfactory Progress* or *Needs Improvement*.

Plat School, based on our 2015-16 performance, is rated as *satisfactory progress* as displayed in the top left corner of the School Report Card. The district's overall report card score is 83.6 with a rating of *Significantly Exceeds Expectations*, or 5 stars. Based on the star rating, the Richfield Joint School District No. 1 was one of only 54 districts in the state of Wisconsin to *significantly exceed expectations* for educating students. Not only is this the highest district report card score Richfield has ever received, it also places the Richfield Joint School District in the "Top 10%" in the state. This news should make you proud!

Again, as DPI stresses, these report cards are just one source of information about our school. Given that, I want to share some other data that helps illuminate some of the successes and areas for future work in our school/district. The Richfield Joint School District No. 1 utilizes Phonological Awareness Literacy Screening (PALS) data at the kindergarten level. In grades one through eight, the district uses Formative Assessment System for Teachers (FAST) to assess our students' progress. In all English language arts classes benchmark assessment and Fountas & Pinnell reading, on demand writing assessments, and running records to document student growth and achievement.

DPI has produced two versions of each Report Card: a quick one-pager labeled "School Report Card" and lengthier, detailed version labeled, "School Report Card Detail." Both versions can be accessed online at http://dpi.wi.gov/accountability/report-cards along with resources that explain the report cards. I have included an 'at a glance' for Plat Elementary and the district here as well. To see the complete report card summaries for both of our schools and our district, please use the above link, or visit our website. Please note that in both versions, since there are too few data to calculate regular scores for our school, you will see a lot of "NAs" throughout.


